


Aaron Brooks: Rise Above by Aaron Brooks and Gregg Brown


Among the Barons by Margaret Peterson Haddix (series, Book 4)


Among the Imposters by Margaret Peterson Haddix (series, Book 2)

Eleven year old Isabella's blended family is more divided than ever in this thoughtful story about divorce and racial identity from the award-winning best selling author Sharon M. Draper




Brian's Hunt by Gary Paulsen


Brian's Return by Gary Paulsen

The Discovery (Dive, Book 1) by Gordon Korman




Ella Enchanted by Gail Carson Levine


Ferguson's Career Biography Series


The Ghost Sitter by Peni R. Griffin


I Survived: The Japanese Tsunami, 2011 by Lauren Tarshis


Lacrosse Firestorm by Matt Christopher


Lawn Boy by Gary Paulsen

Following the laws of our legal system, Evan and Jessie's fourth grade class concocts a courtroom on the playground, putting Scott Spencer, alleged thief, on trial. They create a legitimate courtroom with a judge, witnesses, a jury of their peers, and surprising consequences.




Little Women by Louisa May Alcott

A boy recounts his annual summer trips to rural Illinois with his sister during the Great Depression to visit their larger-than-life grandmother.




Lost and Found by Andrew Clements

Mattie, Sophie, and Alex stumble onto a magical mystery at the Chicago Worlds Fair in 1893. Young Harry Houdini's magic show is failing and the kids decide to lend a hand. However, before they can sell one ticket, they're accused of stealing a priceless treasure. Can the world's greatest magician help the Times Spies conjure up the real thief?




My Dog, My Hero by Betsy Byars


No Talking by Andrew Clements


On the Court with Michael Jordon by Matt Christopher


A Whole New World: Twisted Tales (#1) by Liz Braswell


The River by Gary Paulsen

He is not happy but decides that he'll be fine as long as he can hit the slopes and snowboard. Then he runs into Riley, the best snowboarder and most popular boy in the eighth grade, and soon rumors are being spread about his past—that he was in a gang, did drugs, and that his mother is in prison. Matt must find a way to prove his innocence before Riley's campaign ruins him.



S.O.R. Losers by Avi

The South Orange River (S.O.R.) School is big on sports and famous for not losing a game all season. That all changes when the school insists that some seventh-grader non-jocks form a soccer team. The new team is sure that losing their first game 32-0 will put an end to their athletic adventure, but no such luck.
