


The Borrowers by Mary Norton



The Boxcar Children: The Ice Cream Mystery by Gertrude Chandler Walker (*Series)



*Any book in The *Boxcar Children Mysteries* series is a good choice. However, please do not read books #2, #3, and #74, which are part of our reading curriculum.




Dog Heroes by Mary Pope Osborne

EllRay Jakes: The Recess King! by Sally Warner



Ginger Pye by Eleanor Estes



Heroes for All Times by Mary Pope Osborne






More Perfect than the Moon by Patricia MacLachlan (*Series)

*After reading More Perfect than the Moon, Grandfather's Dance (the next book in the series) would be a good choice.




Mr. Macky is Wacky by Dan Gutman

My Name is Maria Isabel by Alma Flor Ada



Oliver Twist - Stepping Stones Adapted Classics by Charles Dickens, adapted by Les Martin



While it is a wonderful fantasy for the young, Peter Pan, says something important to all of us. Here "the boy who wouldn't grow up" and his adventures with Wendy and the lost boys in the Neverland evoke a deep emotional response as they give form to our feelings about parents, boys and girls, the unknown, freedom, and responsibility. Humorous, satiric, filled with suspenseful cliff-hangers and bittersweet truths, Peter Pan works an indisputable magic on readers of all ages, making it a true classic of imaginative literature.




The Puppy Place: Goldie by Annie Barrows



Ragweed by Avi



Ramona Quimby, Age 8 by Beverly Cleary (*Series)



Saving Winslow by Sharon Creech


Saving Winslow is an uplifting modern classic about a young boy who befriends an ailing newborn donkey and nurses him back to health.

*Many books in the *Stepping Stones Chapter Book* collection are good. However, please keep in mind that the decoding level in this collection of books varies.




Super Fudge by Judy Blume (*Series)
